# What can I do with a degree in social work?

Students who major in social work usually plan to work as social workers after graduation. Students may find entry-level social work positions in public welfare agencies, private non-profit organizations, schools, adoption agencies, hospitals, and the criminal justice system. Social workers may coordinate support programs or serve as advocates or case managers for children and families, elderly people, disabled people, veterans, or people struggling with physical or mental illness, homelessness, or other serious challenges. To advance in the social work profession, a master's degree in social work (MSW) may be required.

# Where can I earn a bachelor's degree in social work in Washington?

Many universities offer social work as an undergraduate major. You can use the College Navigator search engine found at http://nces.ed.gov/collegenavigator to find social work programs in Washington state or around the country.

#### How do I prepare to major in social work?

Here are a few steps that we recommend you take to make sure that social work is the right choice for you. There are many different types of careers in social work, and it is important to do some research ahead of time to find the one that best fits your goals. An advisor can help you choose the transfer degree, and what courses you should take while you are here at Seattle Central.

#### **Step One: Research**

the application process.

Those who are undecided about a major/career can make an appointment with our Career Exploration Center in
BE 1102E to take a career assessment test. This assessment can reveal your interests, values, and skills which then
match you up with potential careers and programs that prepare you for specific career paths.
Social work is offered at many universities, but not everywhere. Make sure your intended transfer university offers
a social work major, unless you plan to major in another area for your bachelor's degree and pursue social work as
a graduate degree.
Student who wish to provide mental health counseling and therapy should plan on pursuing a master's degree.

## Step Two: Pick a Degree

Students planning to major in social work often earn the Associates of Art (AA-DTA) degree. Advisors can help students understand what requirements are necessary for transfer. You may pick up a degree planning worksheet for the AA-DTA (*purple sheet*) in BE 1102 lobby.

## Step Three: Make a Long Range Academic Plan

Students planning to major in social work at a university usually take courses in sociology, psychology, economics, political science, and biology, as well as general education requirements, to prepare to transfer. Many social work programs require statistics.
