Tuition

Seattle Central has five distinct programs of study:

Apparel Design & Services Learn the fundamentals and advanced techniques of apparel design, sewing, and manufacturing.

Commercial Photography Equip yourself with technical knowledge, creative vision and business acumen to be a successful commercial photographer.

Film & Video Communications Learn scriptwriting, editing, production design, directing, audio, and post-production to master the skills needed in the film and television industry.

Graphic Design Combine traditional and computer-based skills in design, illustration and typography to prepare for a career in print and electronic media.

Publishing Arts Use the latest publishing software with advanced Macintosh color computer labs to develop the skills needed in the publishing industry.

Apparel Design & Services

Associate of Applied Science (A.A.S.) degree, 94 credits.

- Students may begin in fall quarter only; work on prerequisites can begin any quarter.
- Apparel Design may be a good fit for you if you have an eye for color and detail, plus good communication and problem-solving skills.
- Areas of study include apparel manufacturing and design, computer-aided design technologies, color and textiles, alterations, and contemporary tailoring.
- Job titles include product development specialist, stylist, design assistant, patternmaker, technical artist or custom designer.



Commercial Photography

Associate of Applied Science (A.A.S.) degree, 119 credits.

- Students may begin in fall quarter only.
- Commercial photography may be a good fit for you if you are imaginative, creative, and interested in developing technical proficiency in photography.
- Areas of study include black & white and color photography, lighting techniques, studio illustration, digital photography, and digital lab procedures.
- Job titles include commercial photographer, photographer's assistant; or laboratory/digital technician in portrait photography, advertising, or freelance photographer.

Film & Video Communications

Associate of Applied Science (A.A.S.) degree, 103 credits.

- Students may begin in fall quarter only.
- Film & Video Communications may be a good fit for you if you are creative, detail-oriented, and have an ability to work well in diverse group settings.
- Areas of study include current technologies in audio and video production and post-production, digital imaging and animation, writing, editing, directing, and human relations.
- Job titles include audio, lighting, set, camera and/or production technician; photojournalist, producer, director, and editor.



Graphic Design

Associate of Applied Science (A.A.S.) degree, 120 credits.

Certificate, 108 credits.

- Students may begin in fall quarter only; a required student design portfolio will be evaluated for eligibility to enter the program.
- Graphic Design may be a good fit for you if you are creative, have strong communication and problem-solving skills, and have an eye for detail.
- Areas of study include design for print and web, typography, and digital production.
- Jobs include employment in advertising agencies; retail, corporate and in-house art departments; publishing environments and design studios.

Publishing Arts

Certificate, 55 credits.

- Students may begin in fall quarter only.
- Publishing Arts may be a good fit for you if you like to create with ink on paper, and work with computers.
- Areas of study include color management, project management, customer service, and computer network maintenance.
- Jobs include employment in publishing companies, retail or corporate graphics departments, software development, commercial printing and packaging, screen printing, digital editing and publishing.
