Major Planning Guide: Political Science



What can I do with a degree in political science?

Political science majors should graduate with a solid understanding of political theories and systems, as well as strong critical thinking, analytical, and communication skills. Political science is a popular major for students who plan to go on to law school. Political science majors may also go on to work in public policy, non-profits, government agencies, or in business.

Where can I earn a bachelor's degree in political science in Washington?

Many universities offer political science as an undergraduate major. You can use the College Navigator search engine found at http://nces.ed.gov/collegenavigator to find political science programs in Washington state or around the country.

How do I prepare to major in political science?

Here are a few steps that we recommend you take to make sure that political science is the right choice for you. There are many different types of careers in political science, and it is important to do some research ahead of time to find the one that best fits your goals. An advisor can help you choose the transfer degree, and what courses you should take while you are here at Seattle Central.

Step One: Research

the application process.

Those who are undecided about a major/career can make an appointment with our Career Exploration Center in
BE1102E to take a career assessment test. This assessment can reveal your interests, values, and skills which then
match you up with potential careers and programs that prepare you for specific career paths.
Most universities offer a political science major, but the concentrations they offer vary. If you want to study
comparative politics or international security, for instance, make sure your intended transfer university offers that
focus.

Step Two: Pick a Degree

Students planning to major in political science often earn the Associates of Art (AA-DTA) degree. Advisors can help students understand what political science requirements are necessary for transfer. You may pick up a degree planning worksheet for the AA-DTA (*purple sheet*) in BE 1102 lobby.

Step Three: Make a Long Range Academic Plan

Students planning to major in political science at a university usually take courses in political science, as well as general education requirements, to prepare to transfer. Some universities may require coursework in history, international relations, economics, statistics, calculus, or computer science. It is strongly recommended to consider study abroad and/or do internships before completing a bachelor degree.
