• Land Acknowledgment (Any)

"On behalf of Seattle Central College, I acknowledge the land on which we stand today as the traditional home of the Coast Salish people, the traditional home of all tribes and bands within the Duwamish, Suquamish, Tulalip and Muckleshoot nations. Without them, we would not have access to this gathering and to this dialogue. I ask that we take this opportunity to thank the original caretakers of this land who are still here."

• Labor Acknowledgment (Any)

"Today in this Present Moment, we honor the survival, the adaptations, the forced assimilation, and the resilience and creativity of Native peoples – past, present, and future. We encourage participants to consider their responsibilities to the people and land, both here and elsewhere, and to stand in solidarity with Native, Indigenous, and First Nations People, and their sovereignty, cultural heritage, and lives. We recognize that enslaved and indentured peoples were forced into unpaid and underpaid labor in the construction of this country, state and city. To the people who contributed this immeasurable work and their descendants, we acknowledge our/their indelible mark on the space in which we gather today. It is our collective responsibility to critically interrogate these histories, to repair harm, and to honor, protect, and sustain this land. "

- o If students are stuck, send them to Diane Coleman and it gives them a chance to respond.

• No Drops for Non - Payment

- Working hard to introduce this, because of the chaos that results from students being dropped for non-payment.

- Critical Issues (Kao)
 - Met a week or two ago, tasked with looking over the employee survey and making recommendations to the President.
 - o Looked for qualitative data, spent a lot of time talking about Safety.
 - Hiring Concerns
 - There is not enough security for facilities staff, RV encampment at Maritime
 - There is a desire for more security but want to be respectful of Optics in hiring more security how would this be perceived by students? Should they wear uniforms?
 - Want to focus on hiring and training officers to prioritize safety but also acknowledge other concerns around "policing."
 - Many staff work until 11:30pm, many are severely afraid to leave work or do their jobs
 - o They especially feel uncomfortable cleaning Nagel Place
 - o Lincoln responds: Just finished hiring an Evening Officer

- Seth mentions: Police Officers ignore Capitol Hill because Officers dislike the way this area treats them.
- Uptick in Mental Health the crisis
 - Trying to think about the mental health of students and those in our community.
 - Could we hire a Social Worker? Someone to respond to students in crisis
- How can we revitalize the campus environment?
 - There is a lot of graffiti –could we try to hire muralists / respected taggers because others tend to respect allocated "turf"
 - Lincoln Responds: The College just put a contract back with a Graffiti Cleaning Company
- Strategic Planning (Wendy)
 - o Bridge Plan from District sent out will send in a larger report.
